"Cap" Beatie's Army of the Potomac Series



During the 1990's and 2000's Russel "Cap" Beatie embarked on an ambitious project of revisiting the history of the Army of the Potomac through examination of primary source — and often previously unused manuscript—evidence. Inspired from his youth by the writings of Douglas Southall Freeman—particularly *Lee's Lieutenants*—Beatie decided to create his own deeply-researched, analytical, history of the development of command in the Union's principal army. Beatie passed away before completing the fourth volume of his work. The three volumes he did produce represent the most detailed origin story of the Army of the Potomac every produced. Three volumes. Beatie, Russel. ARMY OF THE POTOMAC. VOLUME ONE: BIRTH OF COMMAND, NOVEMBER 1860-SEPTEMBER 1861. Cambridge, MA: Da Capo, 2002. 1st edition, 630p., illustrations, maps. Here is the first detailed and comprehensive study of the Army of the Potomac, the Union's largest and most important army in the field throughout the Civil

War. It is a multi-volume work that will be the Union counterpart to Douglas Southall Freeman's award-winning epic, Lee's Lieutenants. Like Freeman, Russel H. Beatie meticulously examines the relationships and performance of the high-ranking officers of the Army of the Potomac, as well as those who served in the satellite forces that also operated in the Eastern Theater. He draws almost entirely on manuscript sources, many previously unexamined, and reaches conclusions about the actions of the Union's prominent generals that differ - often significantly - from traditional historical thinking. Beginning as the bells of war toll across the country and the Union builds its army and ending with the First Battle of Bull Run and the assumption of command by George B. McClellan, Beatie looks at the organization of the Union officer corps and probes how politics determined officer selection and crafted strategy. He considers the corps, division, and brigade commanders (and their all-important staff officers) throughout the entire war and places their actions in the social, political, military, and economic context of the day. This original thought-provoking and important new work assesses the command and performance of the brave and controversial officers of the Union's main fighting force. As new; dust jacket. In the second of a three-volume work, Russel Beatie continues his detailed examination of the generals who commanded the Union's largest and most important

army. In this new survey, he places the command decisions of the army's senior officers in the social, political, military, and economic context of their day. Thought-provoking and original, based entirely on primary sources, Beatie's account and his conclusions about the actions of the Union's high command differ from traditional historical thinking. Boritt, Gabor S., ed. LINCOLN'S GENERALS. New York: Oxford University Press, 1994. 1st edition, 248p., illustrations. Boritt and his fellow contributors examine the interaction between President Lincoln and five of his key generals: McClellan, Hooker, Meade, Sherman, and Grant. In each chapter, the authors provide insight into this mixed bag of officers and the president's tireless efforts to work with them. Stephen Sears underscores McClellan's perverse obstinacy as Lincoln tried everything to drive him ahead. Mark E. Neely, Jr. sheds new light on the president's relationship with Hooker, arguing that he was wrong to push the general to attack at Chancellorsville. Boritt writes about Lincoln's prickly relationship with the victor of Gettysburg, "old snapping turtle" George Meade. Michael Fellman reveals the political stress between the White House and William T. Sherman, a staunch conservative who did not want blacks in his army but who was crucial to the war effort. And John Y. Simon looks past the legendary camaraderie between Lincoln and Grant to reveal the tensions in their relationship. 

Butterfield's varied military career placed him at the center of many critical episodes of the war. He led brigades on the Peninsula, served as chief of staff to Hooker at Chancellorsville and Meade at Gettysburg, and led a division in Sherman's army during the Atlanta Campaign. 

Simon, Paul. FREEDOM'S CHAMPION: ELIJAH LOVEJOY. Carbondale: Southern Illinois University Press, 1994. Revised edition, 240p. illustrations. In this revised edition of his earlier biography, the late Senator Simon provides an account of the life and work of Lovejoy, an avid abolitionist in the 1830's and the first martyr to freedom of the press in the U.S. Living in the slave state of Missouri, he suffered repeated persecution and acts of violence from mobs. Moving to Alton, Illinois, he had three presses destroyed before he himself was killed the fourth time in 1837. His death caused an eruption of antislavery activity throughout the nation; John Brown then dedicated his life to fighting slavery and Wendell Phillips emerged as a leader of the movement. Simon distinguishes Lovejoy's story as an enduring one for both the cause of freedom for the slaves and the cause of freedom of the press. Lightly sunned dust jacket; else very good. Signed.
