An illegitimate, largely self-taught orphan from the Caribbean, Hamilton rose with stunning speed to become George Washington's *aide-de-camp*, a member of the Constitutional Convention, co-author of *The Federalist Papers*, leader of the Federalist Party, and the first Treasury Secretary. Douglas, Robert B., ed. A FRENCH VOLUNTEER OF THE WAR FOR INDEPENDENCE. MEMOIRS OF THE CHEVALIER DE PONTGIBAUD. Paris: Charles Carrington, 1898. 2nd ed., 209(3)p., ft. The Chevalier de Pontgibaud's memoirs show a lifetime of adventures that include, but by no means are restricted to, service with LaFayette and Washington during the American Revolution. While the publishers advertised this as a second edition, it is for practical purposes the first. The original version of these memoirs were privately printed, and even in 1898 commanded enormous sums on the rare book market. This was not because of the memoirist's story, but rather because the original publication was one of the few published by the spectacularly failed enterprise of Honore de Balzac, who then abandoned the publishing business and became one of the most celebrated novelists in French history. William H. Lambert was a Philadelphia lawyer and the best-informed of the group, his collection was famously sold and partially acquired by Henry Huntington in 1914. Judd Stewart was an active collector whose holdings were also acquired by The Huntington around 1914, solidifying, along with the Lambert collection, a status as a premier Lincoln archive. SOLD
